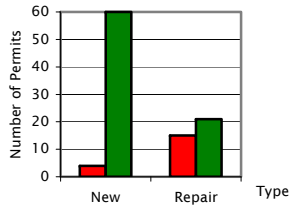
Septic and Sewage

The environmental staff reviews septic system designs, inspects septic systems, and conducts soil testing for new and repairs of sewage disposal systems.

The State requires a property owner with an on-site septic system to obtain a permit from the health department prior to any building conversions, change in use, or building additions including, but not limited to, decks, sheds, and pools.

Private Wells

The environmental staff permits and inspects construction sites of all private wells within the District. We require testing for bacteriological, chemistry and volatile organic chemicals on all new wells. The staff is available to assist in the interpretation of water results and resolutions to related well water problems.

Rabies Activity

Potential animal carriers are sent to the State Laboratory for testing. This information is extremely important for monitoring rabies prevalence in our community, as well as for proper follow-up should there be a human or domestic animal exposure.

Bioterrorism Preparedness



BBHD completed an assessment of our community readiness for bioterrorism. We are one of the 42 local public health regions in Connecticut that has developed a plan to provide mass vaccination clinics for our community in the event that smallpox ever occurred. As part of the smallpox clinic planning we recruited key coordinators, doctors, nurses and other health care professionals who have volunteered to staff such a clinic. About 20 volunteers received smallpox vaccination as part of this pre-event planning.

The Connecticut Immunization Action Plan (IAP)



As a participant of the state's immunization initiative to increase immunization rates among pre-school children, BBHD has been tracking the immunization status of approximately 1800 children ages 0-2. As a multifaceted approach to improving rates, we distributed vaccination booklets to all women giving birth at Bristol Hospital, created and distributed vaccination handbooks to area providers and disseminated information on immunizations at community events including the Bristol Home Show. In an effort to highlight Immunization Week, a large banner was placed across the Boulevard. In addition, a series of workshops on parental bonding sponsored in part by BBHD provided another opportunity to reach the target population.

Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS)



During November 2002 a new disease originated in Beijing, China. Worldwide, 8,098 people became sick with SARS and 774 died. SARS is caused by a previously unrecognized corona virus, called SARS-associated corona virus (SARS-CoV). In the United States only 8 persons had laboratory evidence of SARS. There were no deaths. All confirmed cases had traveled to areas where SARS was occurring. There were no confirmed cases of Connecticut.

Smoking Cessation Program



BBHD offered a smoking cessation program in January of 2004, using American Lung Association's Freedom From Smoking Plus® Program. Twenty Bristol and Burlington residents participated in this program. In conjunction with the behavior modification program, participants were provided either the nicotine patch or Zyban. If both were used, Zyban was provided free of cost and the nicotine patch was purchased by the participant. Follow-up is conducted at 3 months, 6 months, and 1 year.

Oral Health Program



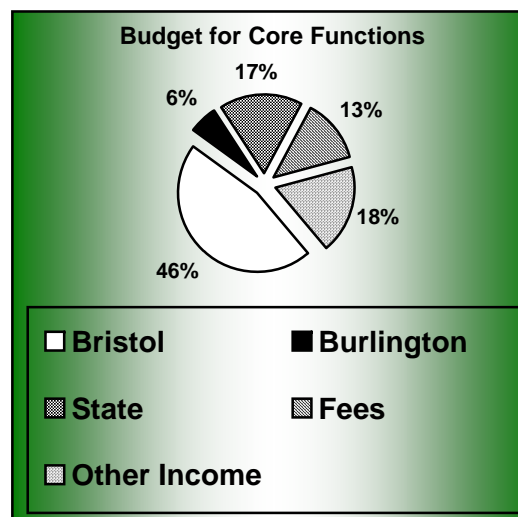
With funding support from the CT Department of Public Health, BBHD conducted a community-wide assessment of oral health needs in our community. All area dentists, pediatricians, and human service providers were surveyed. A sample of parents of pre-school and K-5 children also completed surveys. BBHD dental hygienists also reviewed records of K-5 children participating in the Bristol School Oral Health Program. These data highlighted the need for oral health services for children and adults. Based on the results, the Oral Health Advisory Committee is developing a strategic plan for oral health, focusing initially on the needs of elementary school aged children.

Upcoming Projects Shape Up Bristol 1-2-3



The Bristol Community Wellness Coalition launched a two-year initiative to reduce the prevalence of overweight and obesity in our community and prevent the lifelong chronic diseases associated with being obese. The themes Eat Smart, Be Fit and Enjoy Life reflect the emphasis on good nutrition, physical activity and stress reduction as ways to change our behavior and life styles to become healthier. Throughout the initiative there will be opportunities to participate in the programs and activities at little or no cost. BBHD will be sponsoring a free 32-week exercise program starting in September and running through April.

Funding Information



BBHD is funded on a per capita formula based on Connecticut General Statutes. During fiscal year 2002-03 the District received \$5.32 per capita from the participating towns and \$1.68 per capita from the State. This represents a 15.6% reduction in state funding. Additional fees are generated through the issuance of permits and licenses. District Core Function expenditures were \$690,532. In addition, the City of Bristol funds the School Health Program (\$760,460) and the School Dental Health Program (\$166,579) for a total operating budget of \$1,617,571.
